(a) a holographic mark, or

(b) an ultraviolet feature.

4. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

5. For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1

(a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979(1);

(b) "permitted" price is the price found by applying the formula - $P=D+(D \times V)$ where:

(i) P is the permitted price,

(ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and

(iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;

(c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence—

(i) the holder of the premises licence,

(ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or

(iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;

(d)"relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and

(e)"value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.

6. Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

7. (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.

(2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the operating schedule

1. Our establishment uses CCTV surveillance systems placed strategically to cover key areas of our premises.
2. This monitoring helps prevent and detect incidents, ensuring the safety and security of our customers and staff.
3. CCTV is placed to capture patrons head and shoulders as they enter the building, and throughout.
4. There are security personnel present at the restaurant from 8pm on Fridays and Saturdays until close.
5. At least one member of staff on duty whilst this licence is being used shall be trained in the requirements of the Licensing Act 2003 in terms of the licensing objectives, offences committed under the Act and conditions of the premises licence. Such person shall be competent to ensure offences are not committed and that the premises shall be run in accordance with the licence.

6. Our push-pull restaurant doors self-close, and we try to encourage our customers to be considerate to our neighbour's and to limit noise both when ordering their food and on leaving the local area.
7. Notices shall be prominently displayed at each exit from the premises asking customers to be considerate to neighbour's when leaving.
8. Policies and procedures shall be put in place for collection of street litter generated by the premises and such policies shall be implemented by staff whenever the premises are being used under the terms of this licence.
9. All staff members are required to complete a late-night security module upon commencing their employment.
10. This course outlines essential guidelines, including specific instructions for late-night shifts, emphasizing what not to do to maintain a secure environment.
11. Patrols of the area outside the premises shall be undertaken every 1 hour during the use of the licence and any litter attributable to the premises cleared.
12. At least one member of staff on duty whilst this licence is being used shall be trained in the requirements of the Licensing Act 2003 in terms of the licensing objectives, offences committed under the Act and conditions of the premises licence. Such person shall be competent to ensure offences are not committed and that the premises shall be run in accordance with the licence.
13. No alcohol is allowed to be served or sold on the premises.
14. Where the premises are open for licensable activities on Fridays, Saturdays and Bank Holiday Sundays from 2200 hours, a minimum of two (2) SIA-registered door supervisor shall be employed at the premises until 30 minutes after close with a log sheet to be kept (and available immediately to the Police upon request) showing who was working on any given night that the Police visit the venue.
15. A minimum of one (1) SIA will be on the first-floor seating area at all times that licensable activities take place.
16. A minimum of one (1) SIA will be situated at the main entrance of the venue at all times that licensable activities take place.
17. The venue shall not engage the services of street promoters to encourage clientele to attend the venue.
18. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised officer or the Police, which will record the following:
 - a) all crimes reported to the venue.
 - b) all ejections of patrons.
 - c) any incidents of disorder and violence
 - d) all seizures of drugs or offensive weapons
 - e) any faults in the CCTV system or searching equipment or scanning equipment.
 - f) any refusal of the sale of alcohol to include date, time, and staff member.
 - g) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.
19. CAD reference numbers where Police are called.
20. The licensee will ensure that staff are trained, as appropriate, in respect of relevant Licensing Law; crime scene best practice. Training shall be written into a programme of going review and will be made available for inspection by Police or

other responsible authority, upon request.

21. The premises licence holder shall ensure that CCTV cameras and recorders are installed at the premises and are of a standard acceptable to and approved by the Police.

22. The CCTV system shall be maintained in good working order and at all times the premises is open to the public, be fully operational covering both internal and external areas of the premises to which the public have access.

23. The CCTV camera views shall not be obstructed.

24. At least one CCTV camera shall be placed no more than seven feet above floor level near to each point of entry and exit in order to capture clear facial images of all persons entering and leaving the premises.

25. The medium on which CCTV images are recorded shall be of evidential quality; stored securely; shall be retained for a period of 31 days; and be available for inspection by the police or authorised officers on request.

26. When the premises are open for the purposes of licensable activities, a suitably trained member of staff shall be present to assist the police or authorised officers in obtaining the CCTV footage.

27. Copies of any CCTV image shall be made available within 48 hours of the request to the police or local authority.

28. The facility to transfer the images to a compatible, removable format shall be held on the premises.

29. Staff working at the premises shall be trained in the use of CCTV and a log must be kept to verify this.

30. Signs must be displayed in the customer areas to advise that CCTV is in operation.

31. If the CCTV is inoperative or not installed and working to the satisfaction of the police, the licence holder shall notify the Police within 48 hours and give an estimate of the repair timescale. The licence holder and staff shall comply with all reasonable requests from the police.

32. Notices shall be prominently displayed at each exit from the premises asking customers to be considerate to neighbours when leaving.

33. No noise generated on the premises, or by its associated plant or equipment, shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.

34. The premises shall ensure their staff are trained in WAVE, details of this are available on our website or they could contact my colleague Ms Sarah Williams for further details on licensing@camden.gov.uk mark the email for the attention of Ms Sarah Williams.

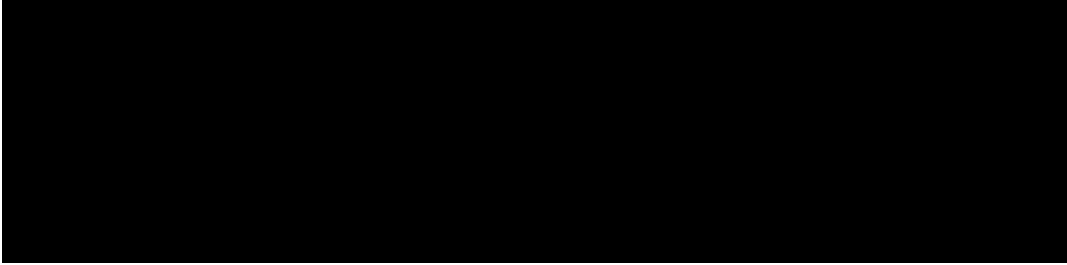
35. Suitable and sufficient refuse receptacles shall be provided to the premises such that they are capable of accommodating all the waste that may be generated by the premises and collection, storage and disposal of refuse can be done in a timely manner. 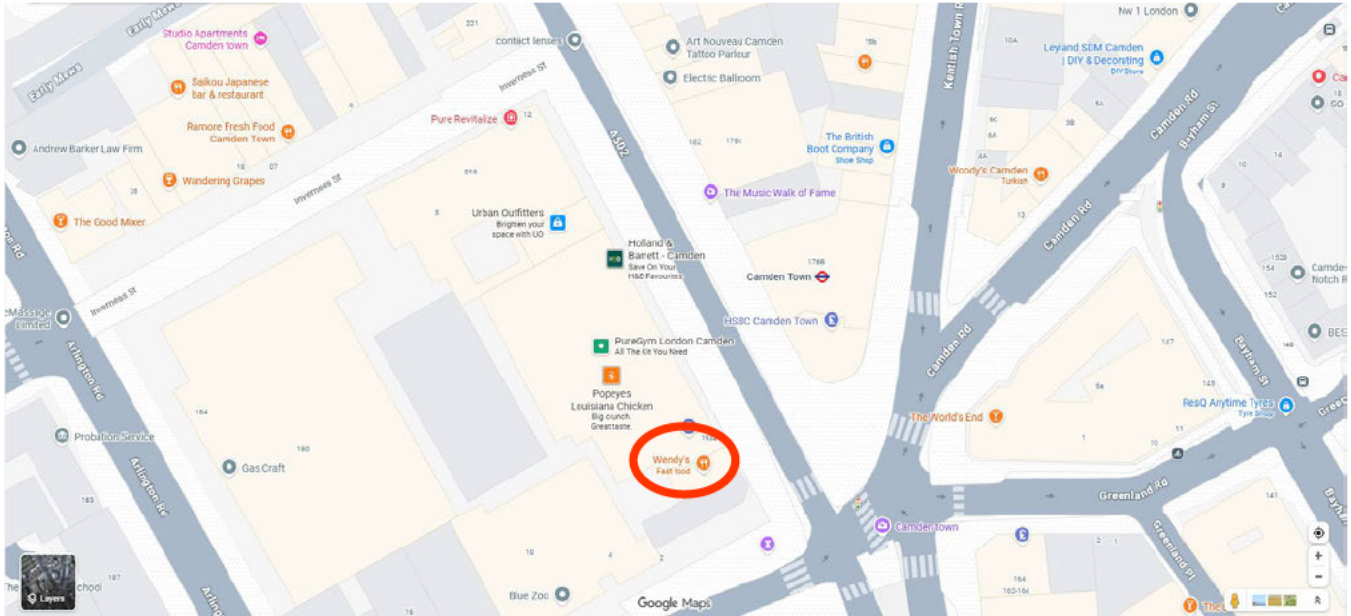

The current licence shown on the Council Licensing register shows that this venue currently operates until 02:00.

The MPS would like to raise objections against this application as we believe it undermines the Licensing Objectives, specifically **public safety** and the **prevention of crime and disorder**.

The venue applied for an extension in 2025, and this met representations from the MPS requesting a full rejection. The venue requested until 04:00 and the MPS provided evidence that the application would undermine the licensing objectives, predominantly the prevention of crime and disorder.

The Location:



The venue, highlighted above, sits in the heart of Camden Town and its Nighttime economy. As the evening progresses, Camden Town becomes a hotspot for crime and disorder.

Whilst late night refreshment venues don't tend to cause issues with intoxication, the business model does still attract crime. These occur inside the venue as well as out on the street in the immediate area.

There are many late-night refreshment venues within the immediate vicinity. A quick search on Police systems shows that these restaurants have violent crimes associated with their operation, during the current operating hours and beyond. Intoxicated people are attracted to late night refreshment venues, generally on their way home, something that prevents them from immediately leaving these high-risk areas. In their intoxicated state they are both vulnerable to becoming victims of crime but also suspects. Alcohol fuelled violence is common within these venues.

In addition, robberies continue to occur this area of the borough, particularly during the nighttime economy, it is a common complaint made by many licensees. These suspects tend to use late night refreshment venues to loiter outside and in, using it as somewhere to hide in plain sight, but also use to target intoxicated patrons. These suspects are also linked to the drugs trade in Camden Town; there have been instances where individuals have been caught with both stolen property and class A drugs outside of late-night refreshment venues.

With the venue's proximity to transport links, many people will pass this location and be drawn to spend longer in the area, therefore increasing their likelihood of becoming a victim of crime and/or ASB.

The Prevention of Crime and Disorder:

As stated above, this area becomes a crime hotspot during the nighttime economy. Most offences do involve alcohol fuelled violence as well as robberies that target patrons of clubs. There have been robberies, many of which are enabled by riding mopeds, taking place outside of Wendy's during the hours they are requesting. It is highly likely that if this venue were to be granted a later finish, it would be another venue used by robbery suspects and those associated with the drug trade to target, this would cause an increase in crime and disorder and cause more members of public to fall victim to these offences, there have been offences taking place within Wendy's during its current operating hours.

As the evening progresses into the early hours of the morning, the demand on Police resources increases and diminishes response capabilities. This does pose a risk as there are fewer Police Officers available to provide a presence and early intervention, this has a direct impact on the prevention of crime and disorder.

The venue has made a proposition regarding SIA:

“The operator will continue to risk assess the need for SIA security at times outside of those specified under condition 14 of Annex 2.”

Condition 14:

Where the premises are open for licensable activities on Fridays, Saturdays and Bank Holiday Sundays from 2200 hours, a minimum of two (2) SIA-registered door supervisor shall be employed at the premises until 30 minutes after close with a log sheet to be kept (and available immediately to the Police upon request) showing who was working on any given night that the Police visit the venue.

Where it is determined that SIA security is required during additional times, the licence holder shall employ a minimum of two (2) SIA-registered supervisors, with a minimum of one (1) situated at the main entrance of the venue; and with a log sheet to be kept (and available to the police on reasonable request) showing who was working on any given day).

The Police cannot accept these conditions as an appropriate safeguard in respect of the impact on crime and disorder in the area.

We have heard on several occasions that venues and SIA staff say they are not and cannot be responsible for the outside area of a venue. One of the main concerns here is that robbery suspects and drug dealers will attach themselves to this venue and they will not be managed, this would require a Police response and increase the demand on Police in an already demanding area.

Recent statistics have shown that there has been a decrease in the number of robberies taking place although this does still remain disproportionately high. The extension of hours for this venue is likely to have a direct impact on that statistic and impede progress.

Public Safety:

The undermining of the Prevention of Crime and Disorder licensing objectives will naturally have a negative impact on public safety, due to the nature of offences occurring at these times. Alcohol fuelled violence can include anything from minor common assaults to life changing/threatening incidents of grievous bodily harm and sexual assaults.

The increase in the levels of intoxication and drug use place victims in an even more vulnerable state, the environment that is likely to evolve from this venue increasing its hours will put members of public at risk.

In recent meetings we have been made aware by the community safety team, that the volunteers who provide the night safety bus services are in some cases, packing up early and leaving as they feel unsafe in the area.

I have worked in Camden for 12 years as a front-line officer and I still conduct regular patrols during the nighttime economy and this area does feel unsafe at certain times, generally past 01:00. I have noticed groups of people loitering outside and near this venue on numerous occasions, both during and after its opening times.

We have also heard feedback during our visits and patrols that the nighttime economy footfall is suffering as patrons no longer feel safe going out late at night.

Conclusion

The MPS recommend that this application is rejected in its entirety, the increase in hours is likely to have a negative impact on the licensing objectives and it is likely to cause an increase in crime and disorder.

Any hearing held as a result of this rejection letter may be provided with statistics.

This representation is made by the Environmental Health Authority, and it relates to the following licensing objectives:

- **Prevention of public nuisance**

The Premises and Summary of Application

The application is for the variation license of an existing food premises which currently holds a licence PREM LICENCE 119183. Based on 2 floors, ground floor and first floor area.

Premises is fast food restaurant, takeaway and food delivery service for customers.

The current opening hours are up to Midnight (Midnight LNR) Sunday to Thursday and 02.00 (01.00 LNR) Friday and Saturday.

The current licence holds conditions to support Public Nuisance Licencing objective.

- Customer notices to leave quietly and be considerate to neighbours' condition 7 and 31,
- Street litter conditions condition 8,11,35.
- SIA provision from 23.00 and 22.00 Friday, Saturday and Bank Holidays conditions 14,15,16.
- General noise and vibration nuisance condition 33.

The premises licence application form is seeking to open 24 hours a day across the week for late night refreshment, which is beyond the Camden Licensing Policy framework hours.

The premises is located on a major traffic route known as “Brittania Junction” in the main town centre of Camden Town and Camden Town tube station across the road. There is a mix of commercial at ground level, office and residential above in the area. It is considered a night-time economy area the number of late- night venues in the area.

Premises is directly onto the pavement highway with no private outside area.

Volunteered conditions across the operating schedule

Conditions

Applicant offered 5 further conditions to support the application.

Notices – keep noise to a minimum – residential area

No external speakers

Delivery drivers wait inside

Litter patrol externally

Risk assess need for SIA.

Comment on application

Comment on conditions, hours and activities

Considering conditions offered, it is noted that Customer notices and litter conditions are already covered by the current existing licence. The application is looking to risk assess SIA presence whilst also expanding its operation extensively.

License holders are expected to offer and undertake more measures to reduce any negative impact from their activities promote the licensing objectives where they are operating extensive hours and beyond the Camden Framework Hours.

The application is seeking to licence activities which pose a greater risk of causing public nuisance up until the early hours. The premises does currently operate till midnight most days and 1am early hours on its current licence Friday and Saturday with 2am close.

The premises sits on a major Highway Junction on the corner of streets Parkway and Camden High Street in central Camden Town and the northern lines station of Camden Town Tube Station. Extended hours of walk-in food service could be a

magnet for those visiting the areas other night-time economy venues. There is potential for complaints arising from noise sensitive residential premises in the area that are likely to make complaint about nuisance issues in the street such as

pedestrian coming and goings,

vehicle movements,

extended loitering on street,

food and waste litter.

Due to the extent of hours requested the licence if granted will likely encourage inebriated customers who have enjoyed the local venues to stay in the area and reduce effective dispersal from the area. Other applications of this type have been determined to reduce the impact by permitting less hours and or delivery service only to verified address locations during any extended hours where permitted.

The applicant continued its offer of customer notices, security staff (risk assessed) and a litter patrol to support the application. In addition no loud-speakers externally and couriers to be inside premises. A key issue which could be problematic and NOT addressed by adding conditions is the increase in numbers and activity in the street and associated ASB. It is noted that in 2025 illegal street vendors had become problematic in this area, being opportunist in the evening due to present footfall in the area. Staff may have little influence over congregation and behaviour outside the premises. Police are best placed to comment on security arrangements.

As an informative the applicant should check their planning consents / permissions to operate any plant equipment on site and opening hours for the proposed periods.

Complaint History

No complaint history for Pollution Team on Wendys operations. Complaints have been received on street activity in this area from residents in Parkway.

Application History

Only last year 2025 there was a similar application to extend hours. This was unsuccessful. This application far exceeds the licensable activities sought in that last application.

Liaison with local interested parties

It is unknown if the applicant conducted any liaison with neighbours prior to the application.

Recommendation

Conditions offered where not already placed on the current licence are welcome, but would **not** suffice for this application to promote the licensing objective prevention of public nuisance.

The outline application for licensing activity is excessive and seeking the maximum possible hours. The applicant could use TENs for occasional seasonal extensions of activity.

The application should be refused.

In an area which is already saturated with late licences, to open until 4am would mean increased crime and disorder in the immediate area. These late night takeaways are a magnet for trouble, as individuals who have left late night clubs and pubs frequent them. The Police are on record as stating that most violent incidences occur in these type of premises when clubs/pubs are closing and patrons who are inebriated or in a drug induced state clash, trouble flares and violence occurs.

Also this may be a very busy High St but there are people living above the shops and there are numerous flats and a block of flats at the beginning of Parkway. (Wendys is at the junction of Parkway and Camden High street). Conditions consistent with the operating schedule

1. There should be no external speakers.
2. A notice should be clearly visible to all customers that they are leaving into a residential area and to keep noise to a minimum.
3. A notice shall advise delivery drivers/riders to wait inside the premises when waiting for orders to be prepared and not to wait around outside the premises. Any driver found not to be complying with this request will be given a written warning that any future breaches will result in them being removed from the delivery service.
4. The Licence Holder will take all necessary steps to ensure that the external area adjacent to the restaurant is kept clear of litter. This shall include a litter pick map area for reference by staff.
5. Where it is determined that SIA security is required during additional times, the licence holder shall employ a minimum of two (2) SIA-registered supervisors, with a minimum of one (1) situated at the main entrance of the venue; and with a log sheet to be kept (and available to the police on reasonable request) showing who was working on any given day).

Section 1: Background comments of the Borough Solicitor

- 1.1 The purpose of Camden's Statement of Licensing Policy is to make it clear to applicants that wider considerations will be taken into account when determining applications. It is intended to guide the Licensing Panel when considering licence applications. However, the Licensing Panel must always consider each application on its own merits and allow exceptions to the normal policy where the circumstances of the application justify allowing an exception. The burden is on the applicant to show that they comply with the policy.
- 1.2 Members should only address those matters that have formed the subject matter of relevant representations. Matters that arise that are not the subject of relevant representations fall outside the function that the Panel is exercising when it holds a hearing
- 1.3 Members must determine, having regard for the evidence, whether granting the application for a premises licence will impact adversely on the policy criteria listed in paragraph 3 of this report.
- 1.4 In accordance with the provisions of Part 1 of Schedule 5 of the Act, where a Licensing Authority rejects in whole or in part, an application for a new premises licence, the applicant may appeal against the decision, to a magistrate's court within 21 days of being notified of the decision.
- 1.5 Similarly, where a person who made relevant representations in relation to the application contends that the licence ought not to have been granted, or that different or additional conditions should have been imposed on the licence, he may appeal against the decision to a magistrate's court within 21 days of being notified of the decision.
- 1.6 **The Human Rights Act 1998** incorporates the key articles of the European Convention on Human Rights into domestic law. Decisions on licensing matters are actions of a public authority and must be compatible with Convention rights. Consequently, Members of the Panel must be aware of the rights contained in the Convention (particularly those set out below) when making licensing decisions.
 - (a) **Article 6: Right to a fair trial**
In the determination of his civil rights and obligations, everyone is entitled to a fair and public hearing within a reasonable time by an independent and impartial tribunal established by law.
 - (b) **Article 8: Right to respect for private and family life**
Everyone has a right to respect for his or her private life, his home and correspondence.

(c) Article 1 of the First Protocol: Protection of property

Every natural or legal person is entitled to the peaceful enjoyment of his possessions, including a licence. No one shall be deprived of his possession except in the public interest and subject to the conditions provided for by law and by the general principles of international law.

(d) Article 10: Freedom of Expression

Everyone has the right to freedom of expression. This right shall include freedom to hold opinions and to receive and impart information and ideas without interference by public authority and regardless of frontiers. This Article shall not prevent States from requiring the licensing of broadcasting, television or cinema enterprises.

The exercise of these freedoms since it carries with it duties and responsibilities may be subject to such formalities, conditions, restrictions or penalties as are prescribed by law and are necessary in a democratic society, in the interests of national security, territorial integrity or public safety, for the prevention of disorder or crime, for the protection of health and morals, for the protection of the reputation or rights of others, for preventing the disclosure of information received in confidence, or for maintaining the authority and impartiality of the judiciary.

(e) Article 14: Prohibition of discrimination

The enjoyment of the rights and freedoms set forth in this Convention shall be secured without discrimination on any ground such as sex, race, colour, language, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, association with a national minority, property, birth, or other status.

- 1.7 When formulating policy local authorities must have regard to the **Equality Act 2010**. The Act provides protection from discrimination in respect of certain protected characteristics, namely: age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or beliefs and sex and sexual orientation. It places the Council under a legal duty to have due regard to the advancement of equality in the exercise of its powers including licensing powers. Members of the panel must be mindful of this duty when determining all licensing applications.

The section 149 Public Sector Equality Duty

(1) A public authority must, in the exercise of its functions, have due regard to the need to—

- (a) eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation and any other conduct that is prohibited by or under this Act;
- (b) advance equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it;
- (c) foster good relations between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it.

(2) A person who is not a public authority but who exercises public functions must, in the exercise of those functions, have due regard to the matters mentioned in subsection (1).

(3) Having due regard to the need to advance equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it involves having due regard, in particular, to the need to—

(a) remove or minimise disadvantages suffered by persons who share a relevant protected characteristic that are connected to that characteristic;
 (b) take steps to meet the needs of persons who share a relevant protected characteristic that are different from the needs of persons who do not share it;
 (c) encourage persons who share a relevant protected characteristic to participate in public life or in any other activity in which participation by such persons is disproportionately low.

(4) The steps involved in meeting the needs of disabled persons that are different from the needs of persons who are not disabled include, in particular, steps to take account of disabled persons' disabilities.

(5) Having due regard to the need to foster good relations between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it involves having due regard, in particular, to the need to—

(a) tackle prejudice, and
 (b) promote understanding.

(6) Compliance with the duties in this section may involve treating some persons more favourably than others; but that is not to be taken as permitting conduct that would otherwise be prohibited by or under this Act.

1.8 In determining any application, the Council must comply with the public sector equality duty in s.149 of the 2010 Act. This is a duty to have regard to the need to achieve the statutory goals of s.149, rather than to achieve a particular result. The s149 duty sits alongside and does not override statutory requirements in relation to determining licensing applications, including the duty to consider all evidence on its merits and the legislative criteria listed at paragraphs 3 & 4.

1.9 When members have before them representations or other material on issues relevant to s149, even outside the scope of "standard" licensing considerations such material must still be specifically assessed in the context of s149. However, because s149 creates a requirement to "have regard" the fact a matter raised is relevant to s149 will not automatically translate into a reason for refusing an application that would be sustainable in any subsequent appeal, given the legal requirement to determine applications in compliance with licensing legislation.

Section 2: Financial Comments

- 2.1 Following consideration there are no financial implications concerning this application. The Executive Director Corporate Services has been consulted in the preparation of this report and has no further comments to add.
