Dear Members of the Licensing Committee,

I write on behalf of the Metropolitan Police Service to object to the grant of a Temporary Event Notice (TEN) to 'Kani Lounge' at 110-112 Whitehorse Road, Croydon CR0 2JF.

We have concerns that the applicant, Mr Ronald SEMPA, will be unable to operate the event in a way that upholds the objectives of the Licensing Act 2003, so we request the application is rejected outright.

The reasons for are as follows:

Public Nuisance:

The event is being promoted on social media as 'OLD SKOOL VS AFROBEATS END OF SUMMER PARTY' (see appendix at the end of this document). The applicant has told us a DJ will play music at the event and there will be MC's. Although food will be offered (there is no kitchen at the premises) it is not marketed as a dining experience.

When the police visited to look around Kani Lounge to assess the suitability of the venue, the management of the premises said they had never previously had members of the public on site after midnight.

The manager said they operated a relaxed Shisha bar that had been open for 3 months only, and there were no sound systems at the venue. They said because they did not play loud music they had no additional noise mitigation measures in place. There were windows in the ceiling that could be opened to the outside and the rear of the shop could be completely opened up to the outside to disperse fumes – these would not help mitigate noise if they were opened because (for example) people wanted to smoke or go out the back at the event.

There are private residences around the vicinity of the shop, including one directly above the shop.

The applicant has stated the event is to raise funds for his wedding. We wish him well for his forthcoming nuptials but are concerned there would be a temptation to sell as much alcohol as possible and allow anyone who pays the £20 entrance fee to come onto the premises, in order to raise these necessary funds.

This would heighten the risk at the event of harm to the public of crime and disorder, harm to children, and public nuisance.

The event is promoted as a commercial music event by 'Pearlchat Fashion House.' Their Facebook page has 12,000 followers (see appendices). If these followers turned up for the party then there may very likely be significant disruption around the vicinity of the busy junction of Whitehorse Road. There is insufficient public transport to handle this number of people.

There has been no indication how people attending the event will travel to it, parking is very difficult in the area already and at time the event operates local residents will have taken most of the available street parking.

Protection of Children:

The applicant has said that children may not attend the event that only adults would be permitted on the premises. However this is not made clear in the promotional material (see appendix) so there is a risk of children attending. Given the event is supposed to be for a wedding, some people may assume that children are permitted to attend.

The premises has no existing bar because it does not sell alcohol, and just putting drinks out on a table to free pour into glasses would not be an appropriate to control alcoholic intoxication on the premises.

The applicant has been advised about the 'Challenge 25' scheme by the police, but this has not been acknowledged in his event plan provided to us.

Prevention of Crime and disorder:

The applicant has said he has no personal license or previous experience operating a licensed event or a premises. He says said he has previously invited some friends to an occasion at his sisters home to raise funds for his wedding. The proposed event will be larger in scale and has been promoted to attract more people.

The applicant risks quickly losing control of the event, and there is a high likelihood that people will become excessively intoxicated and the police will end up getting called to deal with the fall out from it. Unfortunately, Saturday nights are periods of high demand for the emergency services who have limited resources.

The applicant has ignored the police advice to operate a ticketed only event to limit the number of persons at the premises, or get their details in advance and tell them about dress codes and what is acceptable behaviour (i.e. 'no drugs or NOx canisters').

The applicant estimates 40-70 will attend but then notes 'any more then lady luck is on my side.' Because the event has been promoted on social media, the applicant has no control over how many people will turn up to the event and appears to have no desire to limit the number of attendees.

The applicant has said that two unpaid volunteer security guards whom he is friendly with would attend the premises. We identified the risk that unpaid volunteers may not always have sufficient

motivation to deal with the public at a late night music venue on a potentially wet and windy autumn Saturday night into the early hours of Sunday. Adversely they may try to 'assist' their friend, the applicant, by turning a blind eye to things they would not ordinarily do in order to help the applicant raise funds. This may involve not searching, or being less robust in searching, customers for weapons and drugs as a condition of entry to the premises.

Given the event is a 'one off' there is less incentive for the organiser to ensure the licensing objectives are upheld to the highest standard possible as many established local licensed venues do (and do not want the problems associated with 3am finishes despite the potential to make more sales).

The applicant has declined alternative options such as holding a private function for invited guests only, ideally at an established licensed premises. The applicant has said this would be too expensive and not raise enough funds. The manager of the premises has told us they would charge £500 for the hire of the venue to the applicant. This should be more than enough to hire alternative venues such as a local church hall or social club with a purpose built bar and experienced staff available for an evening. We have suggested this option but the applicant says it is not an option.

112 Whitehorse Road has insufficient CCTV coverage at the premises for the proposed event, as such this will undermine the ability to prevent crime by investigating a serious incident at the event.

The premises is divided internally into two halves accessed via a small corridor. This prevents security at the front of the premises from spotting trouble inside the premises or in the garden. Security will not have any radios or means to communicate with anyone other than by mobile phone or face to summon assistance which is a less than optimal solution.

In conclusion:

There are significant risks to the event of security not turning up, large numbers of people unexpectedly arriving, concerns around children, how alcohol will be managed at the premises. The applicant has brushed off these risks and said they are unlikely.

There is a risk this event may become one along the lines we have previously dealt with, and encourage poor planning and excessive risk taking by others on the borough.

We have asked the applicant to consider changing the venue to a more suitable one, changing it to a ticketed event or one with a guest list, or reducing the risks at the event by changing the activities offered or reducing the hours.

The Croydon Statement of licensing policy also raises similar concerns to those mentioned above, and includes reference premises normally closing by midnight on Friday and Saturday nights to prevent public nuisance. There are no other premises in the vicinity used for the proposed licensed activities in the immediate vicinity so there is a risk this may cause an unexpected public nuisance.

We respectfully submit these objections to the Licensing Committee.


