Child Friendly Sandwell

On Wednesday 17 January 2024, Cabinet confirmed it would submit an expression of interest for Sandwell to become a **UNICEF Child Friendly Borough.**

A child friendly borough is one that respects and promotes the rights of children and young people and provides them with opportunities to participate in its social, cultural, political and economic life. Developing a child friendly borough involves engaging with children and young people as active citizens, ensuring their safety and well-being, and creating inclusive and accessible spaces and services for them.

We were accepted onto the UNICEF UK programme September 2024.

Our application to UNICEF demonstrates our commitment to improving the lives of children by realising their rights as articulated in the **UN Convention on the Rights of the Child** (1989).



Vision

Our vision is to achieve UNICEF accredited Child Friendly Borough status within 3 years.

- Our focus is on improving outcomes for Children and Young People (0-19, SEND: aged up to 25). Every child
 has the right to grow up in an environment where they feel safe and secure, have access to basic services
 and clean air and water, can play, learn and grow and where their voice is heard and matters.
- The UNICEF programme will require us to be brave in our aspirations and support a cultural change within the council, as well as among our partners and stakeholders, to ensure that children's rights, needs and voices are respected and prioritised in all decisions that affect them.
- Our child friendly approach has the potential to unite a range of progressive agendas including health and wellbeing, school readiness, sustainability, resilience and safety and act as a catalyst for urban regeneration and innovation.
- The status would not only benefit for children and young people, but also the whole community, as it fosters social cohesion, diversity, and innovation.






- At its core is the concept of human dignity the principle that each child is a unique person with intrinsic worth who should be respected and valued in all circumstances.
- Rights are interdependent, so the fulfilment of one right often depends on the fulfilment of other rights
- Rights are indivisible, so each child enjoys all rights enshrined in the UNCRC, whatever their circumstances.
- As duty bearers, local government and its partners need to be transparent and accountable to children and young people. Having dependable, open and accountable relationships and dialogue between local government, communities, families and children and young people is essential in the collective goal of securing children's rights.

A CRBA also incorporates the **four general principles of the UNCRC**. These are not only rights in themselves, but underpin every other right in the Convention:

- For rights to be applied without discrimination (Article 2)
- For the best interests of the child to be a primary consideration (Article 3)
- The right to life, survival and development (Article 6)
- The right to express a view and have that view respected (Article 12).



Safeguarding

Robust and clear **safeguarding** arrangements are in place:

- Review CFC's safeguarding guidance and share with relevant staff
- Complete and return the CFC safeguarding checklist
- Nominate Designated Safeguarding Persons (DSPs)
- Host a UNICEF UK-facilitated briefing for DSPs



Baseline Study

A baseline study is completed against which impact will be monitored and evaluated, by, for example:

- Disseminating a survey to children, young people and professionals
- Speaking to children and young people at workshops or focus groups
- Looking at existing data



Communications

The partnership with UNICEF UK has been announced and a **communications** plan is in place to increase local knowledge of the programme:

- Include CFC in the council's annual communications plan
- Draft and submit a standalone CFC communications plan
- Publicly launch the programme
- Offer opportunities for communications staff to join UNICEF UK training sessions

Participation

Local participation and engagement teams understand the programme and opportunities are in place for children and young people to influence its development:

- Host UNICEF UK training sessions for participation and engagement teams
- Map existing local participation structures and explore alternative models of youth participation
- Support a group/structure/network of children and young people to influence decision-making



Governance

A committed and informed governance structure is in place, including Child Friendly City or Community Champions:

- Review the governance and coordination structure submitted at the Expression of Interest stage
- Ensure governance groups receive UNICEF UK child rights training
- Provide regular briefings for CFC Champions



Badges

There is a clear, evidence-based understanding of the existing situation for children and their priorities, and agreement on which three thematic **badges** to focus on during the programme:


- Review existing local data

- Feel welcome in the community
- Have the same opportunities to grow, learn, explore and have fun
- Are protected from discrimination



Children and young people

- Feel safe in their homes, neighbourhood and community
- Are able to trust the police, teachers and other adults.
- Can share ideas about improving safety in the community and speak out if they feel worried or unsafe.



Children and young people

- Can explore and spend time in parks, woodland and other open spaces.
- Are free to develop their interests, hobbies and talents.
- Can spend time with their friends.





Children and young people

 Are able to learn about the world around them in a safe, welcoming and respectful place.

(this includes children and young people who are not able to attend school)



 The council finds new, different and creative ways to make sure all children in Sandwell enjoy their rights.



Children and young people

- Can share their views and influence decisions that affect them.
- Can come together to discuss issues that matter to them.
- Can communicate their concerns and wishes to local leaders and other adults.



Children and young people

- Have good physical, mental and emotional health
- Are supported if they have additional needs.
- Know how to stay healthy.



Across Sandwell

- Libraries, leisure facilities, parks, health clinics and other services respect, welcome and support children and young people.
- Decisions about how to make services better at the design, commissioning and delivery stage are made with CYP

- Can move freely in their neighbourhood and community
- Feel welcome in public spaces, shops and high streets.
- Feel connected to their neighbourhood and community.
