The strategy sets out how the Council and Slough Children First, working with our partners, will work to protect, help and support children and young adults (up to 25) from abuse, exploitation and harm from outside the home.

Collaboration between agencies across all professional sectors, and strong partnerships with parents, carers, families and communities are crucial to tackling and preventing exploitation, as set out in Working Together 2023. All children, young people and young adults in Slough are entitled to the support and protection of a response that puts safety and welfare first. Forming and sustaining trusted relationships is at the heart of our approach. In Slough, we are proud to be a diverse town, and we are committed to understanding and tackling structural inequalities and discrimination, which we know can both drive and be caused by exploitation, violence, and harms outside the home.

Delivery of the priority areas within the strategy will be overseen by the Strategic Multi-agency Child Exploitation meeting on behalf of the Safeguarding Partnership.

		We intend to collate this information to inform our strategic planning. In the meantime, SCF and SBC have close relationships with community providers who offer support to children and young people who identify within the LGBTQIA+ community. The strategies priority

		We intend to begin a process of collecting this information to inform our strategic planning. We recognise the challenges for young peop in being able to talk about their identity until they feel safe and able to so. We will work closely with partners and community providers who offer a safe and welcoming space to support to children and young people who identify within the LGBTQIA+ community. We therefore will seek to understand the level of need in this area so we can provide the best support needed.

There is now a dedicated Head of Service with a specific focus on the oversight of support to children and young adults where exploitation is identified through the emerging Adolescent Support space.
